Hidden Star

This makes a 12½ unfinished block

Cutting the fabric:

Fabric A (scrappy light) - one 4 7/8" x 9 3/4" rectangle

five 4 1/2" squares

Fabric B (scrappy dark) - eight 2 1/2" squares

Background fabric (white) - eight 2 1/2" squares

one 4 7/8" x 9 3/4" rectangle

Calvert County Quilt Guild Block of the Month March 2017

Found in the archives of the CCQG

Use bright colors from the same color family



1) Place the two 4 7/8" x 9 3/4" rectangles with right sides together, lightest of the two fabrics on top. Lightly draw a straight line 4 7/8" from the short edge dividing the rectangle in half and forming two squares. Then draw two diagonal lines through the center of the two squares as shown.



2) Still holding the two rectangles together, sew a 1/4" away from the diagonal line on both sides.



3) Cut the rectangles apart on the drawn lines creating four half square triangle components. Press the seams to the darker fabric. The finished units should measure 4 1/2".





4) Lightly mark a diagonal line on the wrong side of the eight 2 1/2" squares of fabric B and on the eight 2 1/2" squares of background fabric.



5) Take one of the 4 1/2" squares of fabric A and one of the 2 1/2" squares of fabric B and place them right sides together with the marked diagonal line placed as shown. Sew on the marked line.





6) Trim 1/4" away from the sewn line and press the seam allowance toward the smaller square. Repeat Steps 5 and 6 three more times for a total of four units.



7) Using the unit completed in Step 6, take one of the 2 1/2" squares of background fabric and place on the unit as shown, right sides together with the marked diagonal line placed as shown. Sew on the diagonally marked line.



8) Cut 1/4" away from the sewn line. Press the seam toward the background fabric. Repeat Steps 7 and 8 with the three remaining units from Step and three 2 1/2" background squares.



9) Take the unit completed in Step 8 and one of the remaining 2 1/2" squares in fabric B and place, right sides together with the diagonal line placed as shown. Sew on the diagonal line.




10) Cut 1/4" away from the sewn line as illustrated. Press the seam toward fabric B. Repeat Steps 9 and 10 with the remaining units from Step 8 and the remaining 2 1/2" squares of fabric B.



11) With the unit completed Step 10, place one of the remaining 2 1/2" squares of background fabric as shown, right sides together. Sew on the diagonal line.

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13) Using one of the units completed in Step 12 and two of the squares made in Step 3, create the top row of the Block by piecing the units as shown. Press the seam allowance toward the outer units. Repeat with the two remaining Step 3 Blocks and one more of the Step 12 Block to create the bottom row of the Block.



14) Using the remaining two units completed in Step 12 and the 4 1/2" square of fabric A piece the center row of the Block as shown. Press the seam allowance toward the center fabric A Block.



15) Assemble all rows according to the figure. Trim to 12 1/2" square.

This Foot was Made for Walking

This introductory workshop will show you how you can quilt your own quilts without free motion quilting. We will leave the feed dogs up and let the sewing machine determine stitch length for us. In this class, we will cover basic machine quilting in straight lines, quilting parallel lines, stitching in the ditch, quilting with decorative machine stitches, and my favorite "get it done" method using wavy lines and pretty threads. Never again say "I can't."

__Fearless Free Motion Quilting Basics

This introductory workshop will introduce you to machine quilting without fear or intimidation. We will drop our feed dogs and discover how simple and fun free motion quilting can be. It's easy! In this workshop, we will cover basic free motion filler patterns including meander, loop-de-loop, and vines. We will discuss personal filler patterns and why it's useful to have a favorite go-to filler pattern in your back pocket. We'll also discuss threads, needles, tension, and how to match your free motion quilting designs to your quilt. You will leave class with samples, confidence, and a brain filled with ideas.

__Mark Your Design and Quilt on the Line

Do you want to take your free motion quilting to the next level? In this confident beginner/intermediate workshop, you'll learn multiple ways to mark designs on your quilt tops and then quilt on the lines. This method of free motion quilting is easier than you think and will open up a whole new world of designs you can now execute with confidence.

_Beyond the Basic Binding

Do you dread adding the binding to your quilts? Do you wish you had the skills to create interesting quilt edges? In this workshop, students will start by learning to attach a clean and straight traditional binding and then move on to innovative edge finishes: fused, escape hatch, facings, zigzag and satin stitching, and couching. Students will take home a collection of samples. Appropriate for traditional, transitional, and art quilters. Six hours.

Trees

Create your own tree quilt below using Cyndi Souder's pattern or adapting her techniques. This 3-hour workshop will concentrate on freeform rotary cutting (no rulers!), sewing curves, persuasive pressing and quick construction. Students must be comfortable with their rotary cutters. The 6-hour version of this workshop includes more detailed instruction on borders and quilting. Pattern available.
